1. Public Comment 8:18 PM

Corey Crawford, Director of Disability Support Services Executive Initiative, says that Resolution 8-005 was passed this year to improve campus shuttle access on the weekends, and is pleased to announce that the pilot program has ended. He thanks the senators who promoted, supported, and took the shuttle. He says the pilot program was a success, with 411 riders over two weeks, showing there is a demand for the shuttle. He says the next resolution will expand upon this and a report will be made available about the success. He says the senators should be proud, this is a testament to our commitment to the student body.

Reagan Budasi, a freshman social work major, rises in support of Resolution 034. She asks for the support of the senators to allow students the opportunity to take ASL.

Executive President Crnkovich thanks everyone for being here tonight and expresses his gratitude to Corey and DSS for their hard work and the success of the campus shuttle. He says SGA elections are coming up, April 11th. He encourages everyone to vote. He thanks the initiatives for the stickers in the elevators. 4. Senate Speaker

A. Major Kirk McLean, Associate Vice President for Public Safety and Emergency Management

Major McLean thanks everyone for having him tonight and says it is a pleasure to be here. He says he has been at Catholic since June of 2020, right when we were in COVID-19. He says he has experience as a police commander in Maryland and has seen serious issues. He worked hard with the community to reduce crime, and brings his experience to the University. He says even though he is not addressing these serious crimes on campus, he still brings the same mindset and method here. He says he loves his job and is here to keep everyone safe. Also, he has brought professionalism to his staff and the campus, where safety is the key thing. His staff have vehicle, bicycle, and foot patrols on campus, all to make people feel safe. He says he is happy to answer any questions and encourages people to reach out, he is very approachable and accessible.

Senator Besendorfer asks Major McLean what his favorite part is here.

Major McLean responds it is his ability to utilize the skill set they have to reduce crime and increase the quality of life. He says in 2019, 13 crimes occurred on campus, in 2020 nobody was on campus, and 2021 had 7. He says he really likes using strategies to reduce negative impacts on campus and also enjoys the interaction on campus. He doesn't take it lightly when someone from SGA emails him, he is responsive and sets up a meeting. He says we have to work together to get the job done and keep the community safe, it is not just a DPS role but the whole campus to keep everyone safe. Two of his favorite SGA resolutions are DPS Appreciation Day and the feedback form. He says he was unable to attend the appreciation day, but got positive feedback from his staff and they are still talking about it. He says that has never been done before and looks forward to more. Also, the feedback form is something that was definitely needed. He says in a leadership position, you can't change everything all in one day or one year. There are many things he would love to implement, but you have to prioritize. He says this form was on his mind for a while, so he thanks everyone for passing it and it is well received. He hopes people use it to address concerns and complaints, and all will be well received and they will work hard to resolve them. He says to spread the word that it is not a form of reporting issues because it is not monitored 24/7. He says they will use it to make his department better.

Senator Curioso asks how one can access the form.

Major McLean responds if you go to the DPS main page, at the top there is an about us tab, click on that and that is where the form is.

Senator Bommer thanks Major McLean for coming and asks if he can speak about the relationship between DPS and the DC PD.

Major McLean thanks him for the question and says their relationship is very good. They play a basketball game with them and he has the police commander on speed dial. He says he can reach out to them and get more specific details if an issue has occurred, and then pass that information on to the campus. At the beginning of the school year, they had active threat training in Aquinas Hall with them. Also, DC police sometimes park outside of Leahy Hall, so we always make them feel welcome.

Senator Kish thanks Major McLean for coming tonight and asks how can we promote a friendship with DPS.

Major McLean responds it is a big deal to engage and that is a task not moving as fast with DPS as he would like. He says for everyone to look out for more initiatives and they are working on starting DPS checks. These will occur on the Nest and different officers will speak about different things, and says to spread the word on that. Also, he wants to create more tables in the Pryz for information and interaction with officers. He encourages everyone to reach out will ideas for engagement.

Senator Kruger says they have tabling, a chat on the Nest, and self-defense classes, but are there other resources for increasing safety?

Major McLean responds there are always additional resources, such as being aware of surroundings and using Rave Guardian. He says not enough people are signed up for Rave and professors were not aware that they can get texts from DPS. He says the first and best method is to call them or if you're in a compromising situation, you can text them. They get it instantly and officers will be dispatched. He says they are always open to ideas and some officers have been here for a long time, so they are always looking for new ideas.

Senator Gehrig thanks Major McLean for being here and for all his hard work. She asks what is the time from when an issue occurs and the email that is dispatched.

Major McLean responds they are required to send out notices if something happens in the geographical area. He says they let students know of robberies so nobody travels in that path and people can be on the lookout if a description is given. He says that prior to his arrival, the notices would go out one to two hours after the incident occurred, which makes them almost irrelevant at that point. He says he is a stickler for timeliness so the information is actionable. He says they get the information from DC police and information is relayed as it is going out and DPS tries to get the most accurate information. If an incident occurs on campus, that is when Rave alerts and other messages go out to let everyone know.

Senator Bubel asks if DPS has ideas to improve pedestrian safety, specifically in terms of vehicles.

Major McLean responds there is always more they can do in terms of awareness, but historical data shows this is not significant in terms of victims. He says he looks forward to partnering with SGA for better signage, specifically on Flather Hill. He says there is always more they can do, but there is currently no victims.

Senator Suarez thanks Major McLean for coming and says as the school plans to expand, what

are the strategies DPS is taking for this?

Major McLean responds professionalism and training are key. He says they train frequently and with DC police to know what to do no matter the campus size. Also, he says listening to everyone on campus and increasing professionalism is important. Recently, DPS officers got new uniforms and they are working on getting new technology and vehicles.

A. Committee Chair Updates

i. Senator Besendorfer, Rules and Administration

Senator Besendorfer thanks Vice President Fahey and says she has no major updates. She says she enjoyed the committee convention last week and had a good discussion with Vice President Fahey today on how to build on it for the future. She updates everyone on her legislation about getting a printer in the Busch School and says the solution will not be going through SGA. Senator Drauschak says his committee had a productive meeting. Senator Curioso has his resolution hitting the floor tonight. Senator Bubel is working on 24-hour access to a chapel. Senator Bert is looking into the homeless people at the law school and improving safety on campus.

B. Senator Corey, School of Theology (Resolution 033)

i. A Resolution to Expand Student Awareness of Tech Services

Senator Corey thanks Vice President Fahey and says most students are aware of the issues with tech services, and it's been addressed before. He says the problem is students are not aware of what they need to fix these tech problems. This resolution is not trying to improve the internet, but increasing the awareness of what the tech department provides and how to fix issues. He says this is feasible by going through residence life and placing posters around the dorms and on the back of the doors of dorm rooms. He says the poster is where students can got to get help, and it will have other general items on it, like facilities. He says this is a feasible solution to many problems.

Senator Besendorfer congratulates Senator Corey on his first resolution and applauds his work and passion. She voices her support for the resolution and says she herself is learning from tech services. She says she just booked a meeting tomorrow with them and didn't even know they did stuff like that. She encourages others to vote in favor.

Senator Curioso says he has one question about the first Be It Enacted clause. He asks how residence life can make sure they know what information they can give to make sure cardinal credentials are set up and working correctly.

Senator Corey responds tech services train residence life for freshman orientation, so that will be left up to them. He says Victor David said it should be residence life to address this because they already have a working relationship with tech services.

Senator Musick asks if resident life is already getting the directive from tech services, then what is the difference between an RA or tech services? She says RA's already inform students what to do if a problem arises, so she is not sure how much residence life can drill into them and what would be any different.

Senator Corey thanks Senator Musick for her concern. He says he commends RA's and their service, but more needs to be done. He appreciates them and tech services appreciate them, but not everybody is getting the message.

Senator Bommer thanks Senator Corey for the resolution and asks how this would impact students who live off campus. He says it is mainly for resident halls and many of his constituents do not live on campus, but still having issues.

Senator Corey responds this resolution does not direct off-campus students, but if awareness is increased around campus, then the information will spread by word of mouth. He says many

resolutions have been implemented and tech services is aware of the issues.

Senator Ewing says that when more people are connected to ethernet cables, the general public will have quicker access to the internet. This would help commuter students, if students used these cables.

Senator McCarthy says this is a great resolution and that having a poster everywhere with information is important. He says he had no idea what an ethernet cable was, so posters right in front of people will definitely help.

Senator Kish says he had a similar resolution last semester. He says when students use the QR code, it tells tech services who needs better access. However, he says the poster is at the other end of the hallway, so the last thing he wants to do is get up and report it. He asks how big the posters will be, and suggests maybe magnets.

Senator Corey responds magnets did not come up or did they think they would be feasible. He says the Be It Enacted clause leaves it open, so it will be left up to advocacy. He does say they will be similar to the image on the resolution.

C. Senator McCarthy, School of Social Service (Resolution 034) 9:10 PM

i. A Resolution to Recognize ASL as a Foreign Language

Senator McCarthy thanks Vice President Fahey and remembers his freshman year when a social work professor said they offered ASL for the language requirement. He says he was so excited about this unique opportunity, but then learned it was only open to social work majors. He thought that this was unfair to other majors, especially nursing majors who might want to learn it for their work. He says plenty of nurses speak both English and Spanish, but ASL is the third most common language after these two.

Senator Martin says that Senator McCarthy put a lot of work into this, and she personally did not know much about ASL. She says she never realized how many deaf Americans there are, so they should be offering this. She says this will help increase enrollment and help us stand out, especially since other universities offer this.

Senator Noory says this resolution is super important. She says ASL is the third most common language in America, so this is extremely helpful and intentional in how we treat them. She says if we can't communicate with them, then we can't connect. She says without this, it is a hindrance, we need to this for the future.

Senator Ewing says she is a tour guide and last month, a student asked her if ASL counted towards the language requirement. She responded only for social work majors. She says that this will help the current and the next generation of students who come to Catholic. She says it would be awesome to tell prospective students they can take ASL.

Senator Corey thanks Senator McCarthy and says he is in full support. He says it is strange that the University offers Latin and Gaelic, when nobody even speaks these languages. He says we have a vibrant community, where this has a wonderful use for all students and not just social work.

Senator McCarthy responds DC has one of the most active deaf scenes, especially with Gallaudet University nearby.

Senator Gehrig thanks Senator McCarthy and says she took Latin, but would have much rather learned ASL. She says she can see his passion. She asks if this is implemented, would it be next Fall semester or Spring semester?

Senator McCarthy responds he is not sure when, but he assures her if it is passed, he will do his best to overlook its implementation.

Senator Zayas thanks Senator McCarthy for this resolution and says she has seen him work hard. She says she has personally seen professors use ASL for communication. She says this would be great for on campus and off, especially just being able to thank people or have a short conversation with ASL.

Senator Besendorfer thanks Senator McCarthy for this resolution and says she is excited for it to be implemented. She says, like Senator Ewing, she gets lots of questions on tours about ASL. Also, she says she came to Catholic in her senior year of high school and stayed at a nearby hotel that had ASL workers. She says this will be very useful in the DC area and near Gallaudet University.

Senator Bommer thanks Senator McCarthy for this resolution and says he is in full support. He says two years ago a former Senator brought the previous resolution to the floor to implement ASL 103 and 104. He says he likes to practice ASL with his friends. He asks what would be the end goal, would Catholic institute a professor to also teach 103 and 104 on campus?

Senator McCarthy says the school has a hiring freeze right now, but the school won't have to spend any money. All they have to do is open it up for everyone, it may become more competitive to get in, but this is about equality and inclusivity.

Senator Curioso thanks Senator McCarthy for bringing this. He says he is hard of hearing and would benefit from AS, but was never afforded the opportunity to learn before. He greatly appreciates the opportunity to take it.

D. Senator Curioso, School of Music, Drama & Art (Resolution 035) 9:20 PM

i. A Resolution to Improve Access to Confession on Campus

Senator Curioso thanks everyone who made suggestions regarding the resolution. As we know, confessions are essential to Catholics, and usually, they are only available in St. Vincent's Chapel during adoration or before mass. However, both options are not wheelchair accessible, making it difficult for him to confess in an exposing space. Additionally, the long lines at St. Vincent's Chapel often prevent many people from confessing due to time constraints. Fr. Aquinas had to turn away many people. Although there are several confession times available in the basilica, the campus ministry website only reflects some of them, and it is crucial to advertise the correct times and add more to reduce the lines. He says he spoke with SGA about this, and plans are currently in the works to soundproof Maloney Chapel to provide fair access to confession for everyone.

Senator D'Atello thanks him. He says he is a server and they do confessions all the time. It is not advertised well, it is important and he encourages all to support.

Senator Campbell says he supports campus ministry advertising confession times that are in the basilica, where the lines are short with multiple clergy members available.

Senator Bommer says he has some concerns. He says campus min has confessions already. The pamphlets say this is available right now. He adds that when he first came to catholic, there were QR codes that showed confession times.

Senator Suarez says the confessions in campus ministry, since they are very busy there with masses, you must make an appointment. She says it depends on the priest, but we need reliable, set times for confessions. The current set times are quite short and are unavailable to many people. She says the priests are open to appointments and spiritual direction or guidance.

Senator Curioso says his schedule is extraordinarily busy. He is not always available for an appointment.

Senator Drauschak says how much time is he looking for campus ministry to allot to more confessions. He says he is worried that this will create issues with so many different avenues being created. How many hours will be designated per week?

Senator Curioso says the hours don't need to be in campus ministry. He says the amount of time would be left to campus ministry and Father Aquinas.

Senator Bubel says with the amount of time there is too much time and he is concerned about this.

Senator Curioso says that can be worked out in advocacy.

Senator Foley says he is echoing support for this. The be it enacted may fall short. He is looking at this from a campus ministry lens and he says when they design the liturgy schedule and they will notice the concerns students have. He says campus min will just incorporate it into their plan.

Senator Martin says the slots are short. She is in support.

Senator Besendorfer says she echoes this, and Corey Crawford and President Crnkovich have talked about making this campus more accessible. She says tours must ask if it is wheelchair accessible. We live in a day and age where we must accommodate to all needs.

E. Senator Gehrig, School of Arts & Sciences (Resolution 036) 9:38 PM

i. A Resolution to Reform DSS Testing Accommodation Requirements

Senator Gehrig delivers the following remarks: "Thank you Madame President and thank you to my cosponors. At the base of this resolution is the advocacy SGA stands for. This resolution will ensure that students are closer to reliably receiving their accommodations for tests. Now, I want to tell you a quick story. Imagine you are back to your first semester freshman year and it is the weekend before midterms. In fact, your first midterm is less than three days away. You plan on studying the whole weekend, but unfortunately, you hit your head and aren't feeling the best. You schedule an appointment Monday morning at the Health Center and low and behold, you have a concussion. You are given strict instructions to stay off electronic devices for the next few days as well as not studying to give your brain time to heal and recover. A few hours later you meet with DSS to go over your accommodations. During the meeting, you are told that unfortunately, accommodation requests have to be made a minimum of seven business days in advance, so you are essentially out of luck for some of your midterms unless you can work with your professors directly. This was my reality. I was already so nervous going into midterms and getting a concussion it only added to those stress levels. All of the plans I had made for studying got thrown out the window and I went from spending hours inside Mullen to not even being able to open my laptop to study on Quizlet or read my textbooks. This experience is not unique to me. Other students experience similar issues from concussions to professors moving a test or simply just adding an exam that was not on the syllabus. For those of you who are not familiar with the process that goes along with requesting testing accommodations, it starts with filling out a Google Form. From there a DSS staffer begins communication with the professor. They have to confirm the information the student submitted such as the date, time, location, testing aids, and length of time as well as get the exam from the professor. As we have all had experiences with, sometimes professors take a while to respond. There are also times when some professors choose to honor the approved testing accommodations and offer the test proctoring services themselves.

Under the Americans with Disabilities Act all students with disabilities are afforded accommodations. As a school that receives federal funding, we are liable and must follow federal guidelines. A large majority of students input their accommodation requests in the beginning of the year and this resolution would lessen the burden and stress on students when unforeseen circumstances arise. When first looking to pursue this issue, I originally wanted to change the minimum time from seven to three business days but landed on five after meeting with Harry Knabe and understanding the back-end work DSS staffers do. Five days will lessen the stress on students while still allowing time for professors to answer emails from DSS and gives DSS staff time to coordinate everything. The seven business day period was over two weeks and changing it to five allows for requests to be processed in one school week. While this will not fix every issue students face when it comes to receiving accommodations, it is a starting point and allows for more conversations to be had."

Senator Curioso says he wasn't sure if he could get the DSS accommodations. It was 50/50. It would be great to have more assurance.

Senator Besendorfer says the syllabus says the dates are posted of tests, and the amount of forms for DSS is complicated.

Senator Gehrig says the process is long and tenuous, and some people have set accommodations over short-term accommodations, and those with long-term accommodations and the Google form with longer disabilities have.

Senator Kish says he has had professors schedule tests quickly, and this should be supported.

Senator Gehrig agrees and says this is for those specific circumstances.

Senator Musick says she is in full support and says as someone with diabetes, she utilizes DSS and says the nursing school is bad at times and dates of tests and exams, which is a hassle.

Senator Tamayo says seminarians he lives with require DSS accommodations and that has ended up with many injuries.

Senator Kish reports on the mixed messages regarding the LC resolution and assures everyone that he will continue to look into it.
